Nature Diary - August

By now, weather permitting, the harvest should be well underway, and the cutting down of the crops exposes many of the small mammals that have been living there during the summer. Inevitably the passage of the machinery also injures or kills some of them, and the chance to feed on some of the carcasses or catch a live small mammal will not go unnoticed by some bird of prey

species. This gives us a good chance to have an extended look at them and their behaviour. The kestrel will be known to many by its habit of hovering in the air whilst locating its prey, behaviour which led to its alternative name, the windhover.

If you get the chance to watch them, you will notice that while its body and wings move to adjust to the wind, its head will remain perfectly still, allowing it to watch accurately for its prey. Voles and mice make up most of its diet, and a whole family of kestrels may be seen feeding together in a recently harvested field.

The larger buzzard feeds on a wide range of items, including carrion. It will sometimes perch on a telegraph pole to watch, before flying down on to the ground to secure its meal.



They have learnt that farm machinery means the chance of a meal and in the winter will follow the plough to feed on earthworms, which are a major part of their winter diet. If the wind is strong enough they too can hold position in the air, like a kestrel, but not with the same precision.

The red kite is larger than the buzzard, not as stoutly built, more angular wings and a forked tail.

Once exceedingly rare in the UK, we are now occasionally seeing them in Hankerton. They are fantastically acrobatic flyers and usually pick up food from the ground without even landing!

So if you're leaning on a gate watching the harvest being gathered in, have a look skywards as well - you never know what will also be watching.



Great War Exhibition

The exhibition to remember the sacrifice of the young men of Hankerton who served and died in the Great War will now be held over Remembrance Day weekend, November 8th and 9th.

The history group visit in June to the Brooklands Museum (organised by Bunny and shared with two other groups) was a great success. Brooklands was the birthplace of British motorsport and aviation and the site of many engineering and technological achievements throughout eight decades of the 20th century. The racing circuit was constructed by local landowner Hugh F. Locke King in 1907 and was the first purpose-built racing circuit in the world. Many records were set there and the displays provide interesting facts about the cars and their drivers. Many aviation firsts are also associated with Brooklands, which soon became one of Britain's first aerodromes. It attracted many aviation pioneers prior to World War I, and was also a leading aircraft design and manufacturing centre in the 20th century, producing a remarkable total of some 18,600 new aircraft of nearly 260 types between 1908 and 1987.

The London Bus Museum is also based there and provided many with happy memories of travel in their youth.

The excellent displays and knowledgeable guides made this a thoroughly interesting and engaging day. Thanks to Bunny for another excellent idea and organisation.

The Hankerton History Group visited the National Physical Laboratory in May 2014. Six members of the group took the opportunity to join with the Cirencester Science and Technology Society to visit the NPL biannual 'Open Day' at its Teddington laboratories. The primary aim of the NPL is to develop more and more accurate means of measuring physical attributes. They take care of the British copy of the International standards upon which all our measuring is based. This is the standards for length such as the metre, for weight such as the kilogramme, for time the Caesium clock, for radio and other frequencies, for gases of all kinds and so we go on in to materials, acoustics, computers, mathematics, green house gases, pollution, and even the universe. Some 25 laboratories we were open to us visit and talk with scientists, most of which covered aspects of research at the cutting edge of science. Some of the subjects were of quite extraordinary range such as isolating a single electron and then close to it observing the earth and then applications for medical ultrasound.

Neighbourhood Watch News

There were three burglaries and a theft of a caravan in Minety and Eastcourt last month. The police arrested one male but still need people to be vigilant. Items taken were mostly tools / garden machinery - hedge trimmers and strimmers as well as a quantity of tractor batteries and tractor radiators.

For the one in Eastcourt two men were encountered prior to the burglary stating they were from the electricity board and were line walking checking the lines.

One was wearing a high visibility jacket with 'Electric' on the back and carrying a clipboard but that was it. Both were white males in mid thirties. A check with the electricity board reveals no known workers in that area on that day.

If people could be made aware and I would be interested if anyone else has encountered these males around that time. No vehicle seen.

Resurfacing of the Car Park with Newbury Flint is now complete, this included making improvements to the edges where the flint abuts the tarmac and resetting the drain cover on the entranceway. Tidying of the front Garden is progressing, ahead of more extensive replanting later in the year. Other projects also being progressed, include some internal redecoration and installation of a kick-plate round the lower wall of the hall; fixing the guttering by the front door, treatment of the wood on the hall, shed and cricket pavilion and repairs to some of the playground equipment.

DOG ATTACKS

There have been a number of local dog attacks in recent months, one resulting in serious injury to a pet.

On another occasion two dogs running free attacked a dog and were finally called off by an "unseen owner". If you are unsure about your dog's behaviour **PLEASE** keep it on a lead or muzzled in public areas and on footpaths for everyone's peace of mind and safety. Always remember that there could be legal implications which could involve the Police, under the amended Dangerous Dogs Act (May 13th 2014). Section 3 of the Act applies to every single dog owner in England and Wales. Under this section, it is a **criminal** offence for the person in charge of the dog to allow it to be 'dangerously out of control' in a public place. *A dog doesn't have to bite to be deemed dangerous in the eyes of the law.*

Generally if a dog bites a person, it will be presumed to have been 'dangerously out of control', however even if the dog does not bite, but gives the person grounds to feel that the dog may injure them, the law still applies.

In addition:

- It will now be an offence for your dog to attack an assistance dog (Guide Dog, Hearing Dog etc).
- Prison sentences will be increased for those convicted of some offences
- Police or an appointed local authority now have powers to seize a dangerously out of control dog in a private place.

Working Parties for 2014.

Each year we need to carry out some routine maintenance work on the project area in order for it to remain in good condition from a flower, and therefore insect, perspective. The work includes -

- Trimming the hedge and picking up the trimmings
- Cutting out any tree seedlings and invading black thorn shoots from the grass areas
- Cutting the grass and picking up and removing


