## 30th Horseless Team Event, Badminton Estate Park

We are ready to take your on-line entry for the Rotary Club of the South Cotswolds' Horseless Team Event in the Badminton Estate Park on Sunday, October 6th 2013 – the start is at 11:00.

The course incorporates the world famous Badminton Horse Trials obstacles and goes around most parts of the Badminton Estate Park. For runners there are 5, 9 or the full 13 mile course. Walkers (often as family groups) generally do the 5-mile course, thus seeing all parts of the park just the once!

You can run as an individual, or a team member with the rewards of mutual support and teamwork, making this event so different from other runs. You might want to run or walk just for fun but if you are entering to raise money for a local cause or national charity there are on-line sites such as 'Virgin Money Giving' and 'Just Giving' available to help your friends and supporters raise lots of money for your chosen benefactor.

Rotary often receives requests for funds, from various individuals, good causes and charities. This year our emphasis is on local charities, so you will see marshals from several local organisations, coming to help on the day. The club will give them a donation from the money raised at the event.

You can enter on the day, but entries received before the end of September (on-line or by printing and posting the entry form from the web-site) will be Emailed a free car parking pass.

## PATIENTS' PARTICIPATION GROUP

This is a reminder that I am the Hankerton representative on this Group, which is a link between local residents and the Malmesbury Primary Care Centre. We meet every two months or so for updates on surgery matters and to air any problems or queries brought forward. At our last meeting I raised a problem over the new 111 service, with which a resident had a difficulty accessing during the first weekend it was in operation. This appears to have improved greatly, although from recent press coverage it would appear that there are still ongoing problems in some areas. The surgery messaging service for out-of-hours should now make your options clearer.

A five-year programme is in place for health checks, and invitations to attend are being sent out based on date of birth. We had a brief talk from the chairman of the Malmesbury Parkinsons Group, Sylvia Morgan. They have some 120 members and offer support, meetings and outings. If this might be useful to anyone who suffers from this disease, or their carer, please ring Sylvia on 822501 and she will be pleased to help. Please feel free to let me know if there is anything you would like mentioned at one of our future meetings.



## Wiltshire Council plans to axe bus services

The Council is currently reviewing the bus services which it funds in the north west of the county. Changes are proposed to many of these services, and the Council is asking for your views on the proposed changes, which it is intended will be introduced in April 2014. This is part of an ongoing series of reviews of bus services across the county, which aim to identify cost savings while meeting local access needs in a way that can be financially sustainable in the longer term. The reviews are being carried out in the context of the current pressures on public spending and the requirement of the council's financial plan to make savings in funding for bus services. They are therefore looking in particular at under-used services or journeys that require a relatively high level of council funding relative to the number of passengers they carry.

### How are we affected in Hankerton?

According to Wiltshire's web site.....

*"Service 93 provides the main public transport service for Charlton, Hankerton, Crudwell and Oaksey in Wiltshire, and Somerford Keynes in Gloucestershire. It provides a link between the towns of Malmesbury and Cirencester. It also runs through Milbourne, which is currently served as well by the more frequent service 31. Service 93 currently runs about every two hours between 0730 and 1830 on Mondays to Saturdays. The service carries around 35,000 passenger journeys a year. The school and college journeys are well used to both Cirencester and Malmesbury, but numbers travelling during the day are lower. Around half of passengers overall are travelling to / from Cirencester and half to / from Malmesbury. Crudwell and Oaksey are the villages generating the most passengers, with Chelworth, Charlton and Somerford Keynes following. Only 1 or 2 passenger trips a day originates in Milbourne, and the diversion via Poole Keynes is rarely used."*

The proposed timetable effective from April 2014, is available for consultation and can be accessed on the Council's website at <http://www.wiltshire.gov.uk/council/consultations.htm>.

Many regular users of the No 93 service are pensioners who use their bus pass for free travel into Malmesbury and onwards to other destinations. Villagers in Hankerton will be affected by these changes, the main one being that the 0932 service to Malmesbury is to be dropped with the 1032 remaining. This in itself would be ok but the return journey on the 1200 from Cross Hayes to Hankerton is also to be dropped. This means that instead of spending a comfortable hour shopping in Malmesbury, passengers will now have to spend 2 hours there until catching the 1.00pm bus – what happens in the winter months? Do pensioners have to shiver to death while waiting for their return bus or spend their pensions in the local cafes so that they can keep warm?

Another hiccup in the new timetable is that the first bus to Cirencester will be at 1117, too late for any connecting services to, for example, Cheltenham and get back the same day. If one catches the 1117, the first one back is not until 2.00pm from Cirencester - again, passengers will stand around and freeze.

## **Hankerton History Group visit the Royal Air Force Museum at Cosford**

The Club joined with like minded folk from the Science Society and Fairford Classic Car Club for a coach trip to Cosford. It is about 15 years since my last visit when we drove our classic cars there but motorway driving in a classic these days is not a lot of fun so the coach was chosen. David Wood and one of the Science Society members decided that to fly to Cosford was the way but unfortunately the cloud base was low and David was only one who made it due to the difficulties of navigation in a light aircraft.

There is so much to see there that one is almost overwhelmed by the exhibits. Huge aircraft interlaced like a jigsaw in large hangers and every space between filled with smaller ones. Walking under the 'V' bombers is awe inspiring, the Vulcan, the Victor just tower above you.

My favourite is the TSR2 that piece of technology, miss managed by the politics of our Prime Minister Mr Wilson. Where would the British aircraft industry be today if only the politicians had the foresight to see that in only a few years they would destroy it by their actions. I must get off my high horse, but in walking around Cosford one is continually reminded that political expedience has cost the country a great deal.

No matter what your particular interest this museum has so much to see be it aircraft, missiles, engines, personnel, prisoners of war, research aircraft all ranging from WW1 through WW2 and the cold war. It all makes a fascinating history

## **Parish Council News**

The Parish Council has been considering an upgrade to the memorial plaque that is dedicated to Jack Tugwell in our bus shelter. This is some of the information that has been researched.

Jack's full name was Arthur John Tugwell. He lived at Elm Farm, Hankerton. His Father was Frederick Charles Tugwell, farmer and his mother Rosa Ellen nee (Painter). Their children were:- Dorothy b1911, Eva b1915, Albert b1917, Ernie b1919 (some of us can remember him) and the youngest Arthur John (Jack) b1920.

From the UK Army Roll of Honour 1939-1945:-

Arthur John Tugwell  
Gunner  
Death date:- 12 Sept 1944  
Number:- 11001231  
Regiment:- Royal Artillery  
Theatre of War:- Malaysia  
Age at death:- 23 years



His final resting place is unknown but his name is listed on column 32, Singapore memorial, Kranji, North Singapore. History shows that the Japanese invaded Malaya in Dec 1941 and the surrender was in Jan 1942, so he must have been a POW for at least 2 years. We will have to decide what to write up on a new plaque. I have told the NOK and they are going to give me a letter or postcard that Jack wrote home from the POW camp.

Very sad and so very young.
