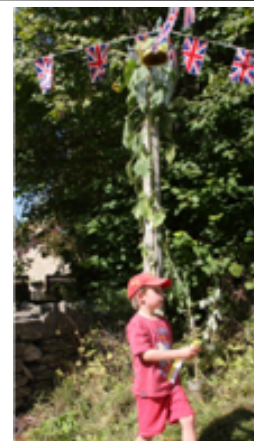

Gluten Free Cake Recipe: 'Tarta de Santiago'

Ingredients:

200g ground almonds (200g)
6 large eggs, separated
140g unrefined sugar
Grated zest of 1 orange or one lemon (unwaxed)
Confectioners' sugar for dusting (optional)

Preparation:

Pre-heat oven to 170 degrees centigrade.



With an electric mixer, beat the egg yolks with the sugar to a smooth pale cream. Stir in the zest. Add the ground almonds and mix very well.

With clean beaters, beat the egg whites in a large bowl until stiff peaks form. Fold them into the egg and almond mixture (the mixture is thick, so that you will need to turn it over quite a bit into the egg whites).

Grease an 11-inch springform pan, preferably nonstick, with butter and dust it with flour. (I use greaseproof paper and grease the paper with a little bit of oil). Pour in the cake batter, and bake for 30 minutes, or until it feels firm to the touch. Let cool before turning out.

Just before serving, dust the top of the cake with confectioners' sugar.

Variations

When the cake has cooled down, with a long knife slice it sideways in two pieces. Beat 200 ml semi-skimmed cream until stiff peaks form. Mix this thoroughly into 250g mascarpone cheese and a tablespoon of confectioners' sugar. Sandwich this evenly between the two slices of cake.

Enjoy.

Edward Cooper's racing update at September

Readers will be aware that in sport you experience both success and failure yet it is the pleasure of achievement that makes the competitor try and try again. Edward has not had an easy year but bear in mind this is a National championship in which he is racing and there is a high standard of competition around.

On this occasion we will move to Edwards own words to describe the feelings when things do not go well.

“ The season so far has been at best interesting! With various issues of bad luck, I am running in joint 6th place in the championship. At Silverstone the bad luck and the lows and highs of racing continued! During the first lap of qualifying, a supply cable for the fuel pump (mounted inside the tank so not usually visible) broke away, meaning I had to sit out of the rest of qualifying, then fix the car and start both races from the back of the grid...

This made for an excellent Race 1, starting in 23rd place, I got a great start and made 10 places on the first lap! It was great fun and I managed to finish in 8th place. This earned me the clubs 'Driver of the day' trophy. I was pleased to have earned some championship points despite my grid position.

Race 2 on day 2, again starting last, I got an equal if not better start and had made 10 places up by half way through the first lap... So far so good until there was contact with another competitor (racing incident!) where I ended up in the barrier on the approach to the pit lane causing a bit of panel damage. So I had to drive through the pits and by the time I re-joined the track I was basically last with a big gap between me and the rest of the pack. The car still performing well, I drove it hard making sure I caught each apex and didn't overdrive it to save overheating the tyres. I caught the pack, managed to start overtaking people and was pleased to have actually got to 10th place by the time the chequered flag came out despite all the drama! I was also pleased to see my fastest lap time was 1/2 a second quicker than the winner (who incidentally was the next car ahead of me when the first lap incident occurred - leaving me wondering 'what if!')

The end of the season is close now but keep trying Edward, we wish you the best of luck for the remaining race and a lot more points.

At its meeting on 4 September the Parish Council agreed:

- To campaign with other parishes as part of its continuing work to increase Broadband speed in the village
- To co-opt Pam Wilkinshaw as a member. One vacancy remains
- To look again at whether the amenity area could be a play area
- To buy a No fly-tipping sign, which will be put up in Downs Lane
- To raise its concerns about the impact of proposed new housing in Crudwell on sewerage in Hankerton
- In principle to the planting of a World War One memorial tree in the village
- Also in response to questions from the public the Parish Council discussed the speed of farm vehicles through the village, whether we should have a defibrillator, and getting the grass cut outside Follyfield

- 2 mice (lovely!!)

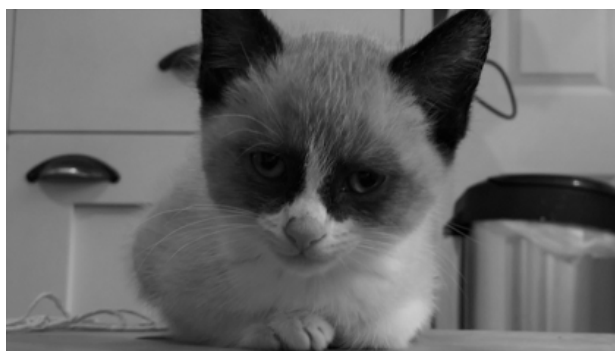
It's just that things keep happening to me and I have a feeling that I'm getting through my nine lives a little too quickly!

Then the man who lives in my house made this den thing out of army netting for the children. I wanted a proper look - maybe I could make it mine once I get rid of those noisy kids?! Unfortunately, I got tied up in it and again Linda had to save me. Thank goodness for Linda!

Here's my current position. I have to improve my street cred. I've noticed there are three dopey cats living across the street. They seem to think they are in charge and pay no heed to my manly "miaow" or my impressive tree climbing skills.

Little do they realise I'm Killer Kitten, and I've just moved in.



Nature Diary – October.

Come October the season of autumn will be well underway, and there should be “mists and mellow fruitfulness” a plenty. Many of the fruits to be seen in the hedgerows are both well known and red in colour – such as the hips of the dog rose and the haws of the hawthorn – but there are others perhaps not so well known.

Did you know that we have one native member of the Cucumber family growing in the countryside? It is the climbing plant, White Bryony (*Bryonia dioica*). It has leaves that are five-lobed, greenish-white flowers, coiled tendrils

to help it climb, and produces strings of fruit which turn from green to red as they ripen. All parts of the plant are poisonous, but it was used cautiously in traditional medicine, for instance as a purgative.

Another name for White Bryony is Mandrake, although the true Mandrake is a Mediterranean plant and will not grow in this country. The real Mandrake root was believed to have magical properties, and often grew in the shape of a human figure, and was said to scream when pulled from the ground, (fans of Harry Potter will be well aware of this!). Unscrupulous traders would carve the roots of other plants, quite often of White Bryony, into human shapes and sell as true Mandrake root – so who knows what the consequences of this counterfeiting operation were.



Perhaps providing the framework on which White Bryony might clamber up is a reasonably tall and common shrub of the hedgerow, the Guelder Rose (*Viburnum opulus*). In the spring broad heads of white flowers, (similar in form to the garden Lacecap Hydrangea), are produced but the ones associated with the large outer petals are sterile, and the fertile smaller flowers are grouped at the centre of the flower head. The Guelder Rose suffers sometimes from ravaging attacks from the Viburnum Beetle which feed on the leaves to such an extent that they become a lace-like network of veins. The fruits will be ripe by October and are borne as large clusters of waxy, bright red berries, truly beautiful in bright autumn sunlight.

Finally, a shrub whose fruits make me ask whether Mother Nature had a decidedly wobbly design moment. The Spindle Tree (*Euonymus europaeus*) is common enough around N. Wiltshire, and come autumn this shrub produces shocking-pink fruits which open to reveal orange seeds – surely a colour combination only likely to be found on some brands of modern sports shoes – but you will know them when you see them.

The Spindle produces a hard, pale yellow wood which being dense and relatively straight was used to make the spindle for hand-spinning wool, hence the name which was reportedly imported from Holland. Other uses for the wood were skewers, toothpicks and knitting needles.

So take a walk along some hedgerows this October and see how many fruiting plants and shrubs you can count – and enjoy them (visually, that is).
