Nature Diary – February.

The days are lengthening and the sun is getting higher in the sky, but February can still be dull and cold. However, there is a small flower beginning to bloom this month that will lift the spirits of anyone coming across it, and that will be most people because it is a widespread plant. It is the Lesser Celandine (*Ranunculus ficaria*), and those who are familiar with Latin Genus names will notice that it is a member of the Buttercup family. It has a bright, glossy yellow flowers like the buttercup, but the petals are narrower and longer, and number 8-12 per flower (compared to 5 in the



buttercup). It is a ground-hugging plant, and the leaves are dark green, shiny and heart-shaped. If the sun is not shining the flowers tend to close up a little, and as they age the petals fade to areas of white.

There is a plant called the Greater Celandine (*Chelidonium majus*) which also grows here, but it is not a member of the Buttercup family and looks more like a poppy than a buttercup. Perhaps more about that one in a future Diary.

Below ground there are usually quite a few tubers associated with the fibrous roots, and these tubers easily separate from the roots and allow effective spread of the plants when the ground in which they are growing is disturbed. They are also the reason why this plant is difficult to eliminate from the garden once established, and it may not be among those plants desired by gardening enthusiasts for that reason.

The plant was also known as Pile-wort, because an ointment made from this plant was used to treat haemorrhoids as the tubers were thought to resemble piles! (Other reliable treatments are fortunately now available – so I am told).

Its Latin name derives from the Greek word *Chelidon*, which means a swallow (bird), but its flowering is greatly separated in time from the arrival of the swallows. Some suggest that it may be that the Lesser Celandine is the indicator of the arrival of Spring, in the same way as the swallow is the harbinger of Summer – and that this role as an indicator influenced its naming.

The Lesser Celandine was the favourite flower of Wordsworth, who wrote three poems dedicated to it. After he died it was decided that a Lesser Celandine should be carved on his tomb, but unfortunately the flower present on his tomb is the Greater Celandine, due either to confusion over flower names, or extremely inept sculpting! This Diary definitely needs to come back to the Greater Celandine.

Hankerton Parish Council

The items below were discussed at the Parish Council meeting on 8 January:

A public meeting will be held in the coming weeks about converting the amenity area (at the entrance of Old Farm Close) to a play area

Free first aid training open to everyone will take place on Saturday 31 March, 8.30am; North Aisle

Photographs of flooding near Hankerton bridge have been sent to Wessex Water, the Environment Agency and Wiltshire Council

The meeting agreed increases to the churchyard support payment and to the Grapevine contribution, and a special payment to the PCC (Parochial Church Council) for tree work. To meet the cost of these payments in April the council tax contribution to the Parish Council will increase by £1.99 to £26.38 for band D householders (less or more pro rata for other bands)

Shayne Smith was co-opted onto the Parish Council

At its November meeting the Parish Council agreed an emergency plan in the event of snow, disruption of water or electricity supply, fire and flooding. Useful information in the plan will be put up in the bus shelter.

A vacancy remains for the Parish Council. If interested contact the Parish Clerk; contact details are on the Hankerton website.

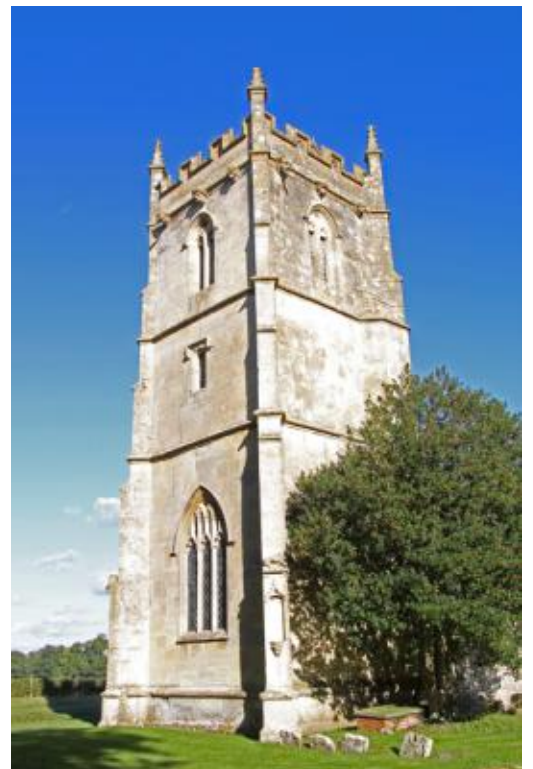

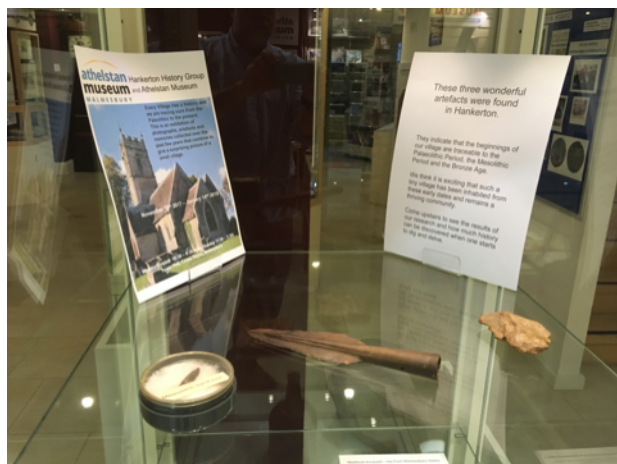
Exhibition in the Athelstan Museum
