Nature Diary – August 2019.

The Red Admiral butterfly (*Vanessa atalanta*) is familiar to most people, as it is very striking to look at. Predominantly black in colour, but with orange-red bands on the upperside of each wing, and white spots towards the front of each forewing.

All but the mildest of winters kills off most of the Red Admirals in the UK, but with climate change there are increasing numbers over-wintering in the far south. Those that do overwinter are said to be "dormant" rather than "hibernating", as they may fly on warm days. The majority of Red Admirals fly south at the end of the autumn to avoid our winter, and return to southern Europe or North Africa.

They migrate at quite high altitudes (2000 metres) and have even been identified in large numbers by meteorological radar. At this altitude they pick up northerly winds and can be back in North Africa in 5 weeks. Once back in these southerly countries they start to breed again.

Come the Spring, the population of butterflies sets off north across Europe, beginning to arrive in the UK in large numbers from May onwards, but occasional individuals may be seen as early as March (but did they successfully overwinter, rather than fly back from the south?). Once here they set about reproducing, and the female butterflies lay eggs on the Stinging Nettle (*Urtica dioica*), preferring lush nettles growing in full sun or slight shade. As most eggs are laid in July/August when nettles tend to be older and tougher, cutting nettles in late June to encourage regrowth produces nettles that are very attractive to laying females.

The caterpillars live singly and by using silk threads build small tents from the leaves at shoot tips, changing sites as they grow. The caterpillar just before it pupates chews through the stem of a nettle tip so that it topples over, and will pupate within the spun together leaves.

Your likelihood of seeing Red Admirals increases as the summer progresses and the new generation emerges. They enjoy feeding from flowers, especially Buddleia sp., and are particularly fond of rotting fruit, such as windfall apples or split plums. Into the Autumn they will often be seen feeding from the flowers of Ivy, before some internal trigger persuades them to migrate south. When seen in flight it looks like a powerful butterfly, but it is still an incredible fact that they may have flown 2 – 3,000 miles to visit our neighbourhood. So make sure that you enjoy their beautiful colours and patterns, and marvel at the effort made by them at the same time.

OUR SELF-DRIVE COMMUNITY MINI-BUS

Summer??!! Well, it has a long way to go as, at the time of writing, its pouring down out there!

Yet, Summer is the time we think of holidays and going places. It's great if you can go out and about with friends to somewhere special, but transport is an eternal problem particularly if a group of you would fill more than one car.

How about hiring a bus? Malmesbury is very fortunate to have two community minibuses, one of which, **The Cartmell Mini-bus** (named after the legendary Malmesbury youth worker who died in his prime) is 'self-drive', readily available most days of the week and incredibly cheap!



Available on an ad hoc basis to any non-commercial community-orientated group, the self-drive **Cartmell Minibus costs just 95p per mile *including* fuel and insurance!**

If yours is a community group, why not get your friends together for a day out somewhere?

You will need a volunteer to drive, of course; but provided he or she has a clean driving licence, and undertakes a brief introduction to the vehicle and a 'one-off' assessment test (for which there is a small fee) your driver can be formally registered as a Cartmell driver. Then your group can be off, driving toWell, who knows where? That's up to you. And, with your driver now registered, you can go as many times as you like!

The minibus takes up to 17 people (including your driver). Seat-belts are attached to every seat. It also has a lift and wheelchair securing points for two chairs (though, obviously, that reduces the number of other seats).

The hire charge for this 17-seater self-drive minibus is just 95p/mile, inclusive of fuel and insurance!

Parish Council Update

At its meeting on 8 July the Parish Council:

Agreed to hold a public vote about the amenity area in Old Farm Close being used as a play area

Agreed to ask Wiltshire Council for two strips across two roads in and out of Hankerton to count traffic volume

Noted that the installation of the defibrillator in the phone box has been delayed to July/August

Noted that Hankerton came third in the Best Kept Village competition

Rotary in Wiltshire raises £42,000 to provide new mobile classroom

Wiltshire's Rotary Clubs are delighted to announce they have provided a new mobile classroom to Life Education Centre (Wiltshire). Eleven clubs from across Wiltshire, including the local Rotary Club of the South Cotswolds, raised £12,000 and successfully applied for a grant of £30,000 from the worldwide Rotary Foundation to purchase the new unit.

The arrival of the new mobile classroom was celebrated at a reception on 26th June attended by some 60 guests including Deputy Lord Lieutenant of Wiltshire, the High Sheriff of Wiltshire and the Chairman of Wiltshire Council.



The Life Education Centre (LEC) mobile classroom visits many of the primary schools in Malmesbury and the surrounding villages to provide children aged 4 to 11 with the knowledge and skills needed to make the right decisions in life. The programme includes education on health, relationships and wellbeing. LEC works in association with the CORAM charity, schools and parents to deliver a series of sessions linked to the National Curriculum using the specially designed high-tech mobile classroom and highly trained educators. The mobile classroom and its specialist educators are essential in giving the children an exciting experience. This enables difficult topics such as managing risks from exposure to drugs and alcohol, the internet and personal relationships in a sensitive and protective environment. Several local primary schools have told the Rotary Club of the South Cotswolds that the visits of the LEC mobile classroom and its specialist educators are highly valued.

The Life Education programme has been going for over 20 years – Rotary has been a key contributor and partner since the start. The latest mobile classroom replaces the previous one which has now reached the end of its useful life. This academic year alone, LEC (Wiltshire) will support nearly 12,000 children in around 80 Wiltshire Schools.

Volunteers from the Rotary Club of Royal Wootton Bassett & District are responsible for managing the programme and for towing and installing the classroom in North Wiltshire primary schools. Phil Tanner, President of Royal Wootton Bassett & District Rotary Club, commented *"The way the Rotary Clubs in Wiltshire have rallied round to raise the money demonstrates the strong commitment of Rotary to support its local communities. I would like to thank all the clubs who donated to this appeal. This will benefit children across Wiltshire for many years to come."*

Peter Wyman, President of the local Rotary Club of the South Cotswolds, said that the Club will continue to support the Wiltshire Life Education Centre throughout his presidential year.



Surgery Update

Malmesbury Primary Care continues to work closely with other surgeries in sharing appointments, pharmacists and specialists. By working together, GPs and other healthcare providers will be able to improve their provision to patients and build on shared practices and experience. They will also be able to pool resources.

GP Peter Torrance left in July 2019 and in his place Dr Thomas Winwood is rejoining the practice on a part time basis. Interviews are ongoing for a second GP to cover some of Dr Torrance and other doctor's sessions.

For some blood test analysis, a centrifugal machine was used. This machine was on loan to the surgery and was trialled for a period of time to help with appointments but was returned owing to the fact that there were too many incorrect results and quite a few patients were asked to return for re tests. The team of phlebotomists has since been increased and bloods are now taken before 11 o'clock for collection at 11.15 am.

For patients seen at hospitals other than the RUH they can obtain blood results when they are seen at their respective outpatients. Whilst you can get the results from the surgery (over the phone, or calling in for a print out) it was recommended that patients register onto the practice online service (systmonline), which as well as being able to book appointments, order repeat medications you also have the option to view your blood results. Patients can get details of this service from reception or the website.

The Bisset Love Letters (Anne Holland)

On 6th June Dr Diane Lovell of Blinn College, Texas gave a fascinating talk on the letters sent by the Rev. George Bisset, Vicar of Malmesbury, to Lady Catherine Howard at Charlton Park. Thanks to support from both the Hankerton and the Sherborne History Groups, we had an audience of 27 to hear of the initial disapproval of Lady Catherine's family, the Rev Bisset's time as a missionary in Sri Lanka and the couple's eventual marriage after 18 years of courtship. Dr Lovell pointed out similarities to characters and plots in Jane Austen's works and showed that Jane Austen and Lady Catherine both visited Bath at the same date. We were all thankful that the love letters were saved from destruction, and discovered by such a knowledgeable historian. This stimulating evening raised £155 towards Charlton Recreational Centre. Thank you to all we attended.
