## **Nature Diary – October 2021**

The Hedgehog - perhaps one of our most loved mammals and yet it is in severe decline, to such an extent that it has been classified as "Vulnerable to Extinction" (in the next 20 years) on the Red List of British Mammals. It is hard to imagine how the Hedgehog has got to this perilous position, when children's stories abound with good natured Hedgehog characters, and it

is surely one of those few species that most children would be able to identify.

The male (boar) is larger than the female (sow), both are covered on their backs and sides with a coat of prickly spines, and their undersides with coarse hairs. When in danger they roll up into a defensive ball, and small muscles hold the spines tautly in place, so that to even pick one up gently in bare hands causes a lot of discomfort. This will afford protection from the majority of predators, but the badger has claws long enough to unroll the hedgehog, and it is said that foxes will roll them into water and to avoid drowning they have to unroll and swim, which leaves them exposed to attack by the fox.

An interesting experiment was carried out where blown (i.e. empty) quails eggs were filled with either sterile water, water mixed with cow dung, and water mixed with badger dung. These "bombs" were dropped ahead of hedgehogs wandering around their home range, and with the first two the hedgehogs kept on walking on their original course, but the badger scent caused the hedgehog to turn around and run away. They obviously consider badgers as a serious threat.

The sow will produce one or two litters of young a year. They are born naked and blind and suckled in the nest until they are able to forage for food themselves. You could be very lucky and see the female leading her young in single file on foraging trips early in the twilight. The normal diet consists of insects, worms, slugs and snails, mice, rats and frogs, and their favourite snack is grasshoppers. There are descriptions of hedgehogs killing and eating snakes, even venomous adders, which strike repeatedly at the hedgehog's spines, become exhausted and are then despatched by the hedgehog.

Research has established that a viable population of hedgehogs consists of a minimum of 30 individuals occupying a territorial range of 90 hectares (nearly a square kilometre). One of the major factors in their decline is that their habitat is becoming more and more fragmented, especially by the construction of roads and buildings, walls and fences, and their ability to roam becomes restricted. As their name suggests they are creatures that usually forage in the hedgerows. Fields of monoculture agriculture (crops and grass) provide little in the way of food, and hedges have been lost in large quantities.

Fortunately, gardens do provide a good, varied habitat for them, and there are plenty of gardens, but our use of the gardens can make them less useful. Firstly, fences can stop hedgehogs accessing some gardens or moving through to the next one (fragmenting their habitat), so try to leave gaps (about 13 cm square – the size of an old CD case) for them to pass through. We have become more and more tidy in our gardening, and they need "rougher" areas to make nests and overwinter. Finally, widespread use of slug bait and other insecticides (in gardens and agricultural fields) has reduced the food supply available to them.



Traditionally people used to put out bread and milk for hedgehogs in the garden. Sadly, they cannot digest milk which causes diarrhoea, so this should be avoided. The best option is cat or dog food which could be wet tinned food, or dry biscuits, but the latter should be softened in water, as hedgehogs have weak teeth and a hard biscuit would prove difficult for them.



Everyone enjoys seeing a hedgehog, so let's all do what we can to reverse their decline. Keep them wandering by leaving gaps in fences (or walls), leave undisturbed, rougher corners in the garden with long grass and plenty of dry leaves around, ideally close to the base of a hedge, and let's use a lot less pesticides, which will benefit more than just hedgehogs.

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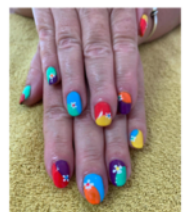

## HANKERTON HISTORY – DID YOU KNOW? #7

Some of you may know the book "Gallipot Eyes" by Elspeth Huxley which tells of life in Oaksey in the mid-1970s. In July 1974 she records "At six o'clock the chimes of Hankerton Church came limpidly across the fields". Did you know that our church even had bells and that they had chimed within living memory?

These aren't just any bells, Hankerton Holy Cross has one of the most historically important and un-spoilt belfries in Wiltshire. The bell frame is virtually unaltered since the start of the 17th century, with 3 of the bells amazingly pre-dating the frame.

The 4 bells with founder and date are:

Treble:	Thomas Gefferies of Bristol c. 1520
2 <sup>nd</sup>	Roger Purdue of Bristol c. 1613
3 <sup>rd</sup>	Henry Jeffries of Bristol c. 1540
Tenor	Unknown founder c. 1350

Just think that when the Tenor was hoisted aloft Edward III was on the throne and the country was struggling with the Black Death. All the bells are "maiden" meaning that they have not been tuned since their installation. According to experts the Treble and bell 3 are crude with a poor tone but bell 2 and the Tenor are fine castings.



The Church tower has a date stone of 1531, pre-dating the Tenor bell so it has witnessed many changes over more than 6 centuries.

The frame bears the initials "1600 RW RH ", it is the earliest surviving dated frame in Wiltshire, and one of the earliest in England. The initials may be those of Church Wardens or the makers of the frame.

The bells have not been full-circle rung for a very long time, and could not be without substantial remedial work to frame, wheels, and headstocks. The bells were "clocked", i.e. the clapper was pulled by wires from a small clavier at the base of the tower, until the 20<sup>th</sup> century but stopped because of the risk of cracking the bells. This must have been what Elspeth Huxley heard. The necessary visits to the belfry today are done with great care.

It is most likely that the bells were cast adjacent to the church. Hankerton History Group have long wondered if depressions near the current gate could indicate where this was carried out. We can never know.

## **Patients Participation Group**

### **Surgery News**

In June 2019 the surgery completed 7378 appointments and 7875 in June 2021 (an increase of 497), of which 62% were face to face.

Local data shows that demand for appointments has increased by 73% since May 2020. To deal with this increase, Malmesbury Primary Care Centre (MPCC) have appointed new pharmacists and physiotherapists, installed new phone lines, increased appointment numbers, and introduced a separate service for ordering medication to help release staff.

In June, GP partners increased the length of their clinics to try to make more appointments available and have successfully recruited additional admin staff as well as another GP who will join in September. Going into the autumn, MPCC prepares to roll out Phase 3 of the vaccine programme and all this on top of inviting, recalling and administering over 20,000 COVID Vaccines in 2021. The situation is being carefully monitored as MPCC struggles to keep up with demand.

### **Staffing**

There are a number of new doctors at the surgery and also 2 trainee GP's to meet the present demand for appointments.

Doctors will continue to triage patients at present.

A new patient survey which will cover patient's appointment preferences will be available soon.

There has been a revamp of the administration team with new posts created for a receptionist and an administrative apprentice.

### **Pharmacists**

The primary care network now employs the equivalent of 5 full time pharmacists and 2 pharmacy technicians, patients can contact the pharmacists through reception to discuss problems/medication. The aim of the pharmacists is to support the GP's and make sure that patient's medication is managed in the best possible way and make changes if required. This saves the GP's valuable time. The pharmacists will hold medical reviews with patients either face to face or by telephone. The pharmacists can also prescribe medication should it be required.



### **Physiotherapists**

3 physiotherapists are employed by the primary care network and patients can book an appointment through reception. A number of patients have a wide range of musculoskeletal, back and shoulder pain which can be expertly treated not by their GP but by a physiotherapist. They can complete a thorough examination, prescribe exercise, and suggest lifestyle changes. This initial contact will lessen the strain on the GP's. Using this service patients have benefited by shorter waiting times, less appointments to access high quality care and begin recovery.

### **Flu/Covid**

Everyone over age 50, as well as those at risk under age 50, are to be invited for the flu jab. 6,000 vaccines have been ordered and delivery is expected in September. It is hoped the Covid vaccine can be administered at the same time as the flu jab, but this is dependent on availability. The vaccination team are going to possibly work evenings and weekends to get as many people vaccinated as required before the winter season.

### **Prescription Ordering Direct**

POD is available to order repeat medication and is a safer and more effective way of issuing repeat prescription. It also saves a considerable amount of money and doctor's time.

A reminder about the Surgery's Website, which holds a lot of information e.g. Doctor Link which is a new electronic symptom checker which gives 24hr access to trusted medical advice, book, check or cancel appointments, see parts of your health records as long as you are registered with the surgery.

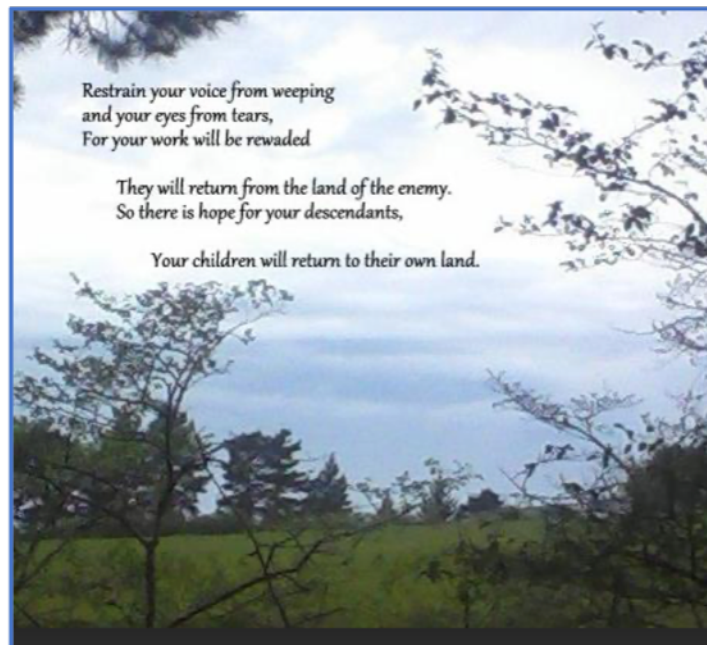

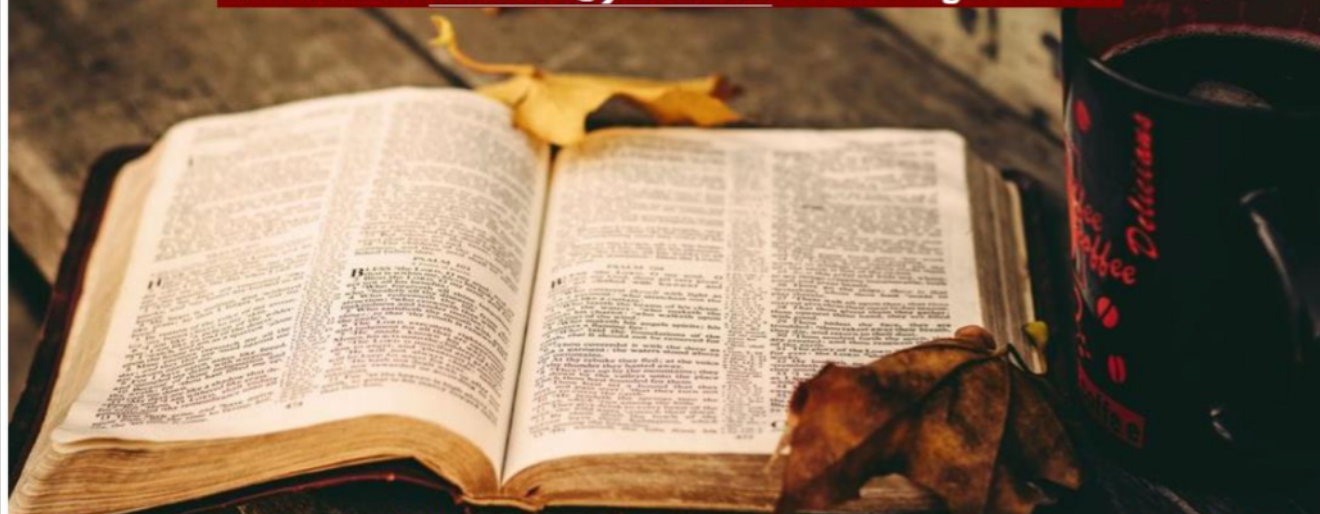
