Nature Diary – June 2022.


This month I thought that I'd discuss a species of butterfly that has declined in numbers over a very long period of time but is the focus of an initiative to improve its fortunes here in North Wiltshire. The butterfly is the Marsh Fritillary (*Euphydryas aurinia*), a very attractive medium sized butterfly, whose wings are divided up into numerous panels of colour, consisting of warm browns, oranges and creams. On a sunny day, it is a beautiful creature to have a close look at.



One reference claims that this species is one of the most rapidly declining butterflies in Europe, and in the UK, surviving colonies are found mainly on the western side of the mainland and through much of Ireland. Historically, there are reports of the caterpillars being present in such numbers that when they moved around in search of food, country dwellers had to sweep up the caterpillars or block off the gap under the house door to stop them crawling inside in their thousands (Reports from Co. Fermanagh and Co. Clare in Ireland).

Wiltshire is fortunate to still have quite a few colonies, and it can be seen if you visit the remaining colony sites from May to July when the adults are flying. From its name you will deduce that it is a species of damp areas, which is mostly true, but in Wiltshire many of the butterflies survive on areas such as the Marlborough Downs and Barbury Castle – areas of chalk that are fairly free-draining. The food plant for the caterpillar stage of the life cycle is the Devilsbit Scabious (*Succisa pratensis*) which tends to grow on damper ground, but up on the chalk downland the caterpillars seem to have taken to eating the more commonly found Small Scabious (*Scabiosa columbaria*).

So what has happened, as after all, Devilsbit Scabious is a commonly seen flowering plant in our countryside and the caterpillars should have plenty to eat. The problem is mainly down to our management of the land. Firstly, we have drained huge areas of the countryside for agricultural production, reducing the area in which the food plant grows. The Devilsbit Scabious does still grow in many flower meadows, of which we have many in North Wiltshire, but most of these would be cut for hay in late summer (a management regime that suits many flower and insect species), and this is perhaps the major problem. The species overwinters in the caterpillar stage, with the small caterpillars weaving silk "tents" deep in the grassy tussocks, which afford them some protection from the worst of the winter weather. However, grassy tussocks do not exist on hay meadows after they have been cut, and any caterpillars present would not get through the winter. They may have thrived on the food plant but they would not make it through to become adult butterflies



Cloatley Meadows have traditional hay meadows, mainly to the north of the reserve, but there are two large fields adjacent to the Cloatley Road which are not cut for hay, are fairly wet, are lightly grazed by cattle so that the vegetation is longer and of a tussocky nature **and** has very numerous patches of Devilsbit Scabious. These fields would be ideal in terms of make-up and management for the species, and it is hoped that there will be some expansion of populations in the Minety area to find their way down to Hankerton.

There is one slight problem and that is, that the female butterfly when laden with eggs is not able to fly very far, whereas the males range much further, but it is the females with their fertilised eggs that are key to the spread of the species. After she has laid the bulk of the eggs, flight is easier and the remaining eggs may be deposited further from where she initially laid. The Wiltshire Wildlife Trust is actively increasing the areas of suitable land, and planting the required Devilsbit Scabious, to try and bridge the gaps between suitable parcels of land and allow expansion of the species. Volunteers carry out surveys for the signs of the caterpillars and their silk tents during the Autumn and Spring, so perhaps in the not-too-distant future, we shall be able to report the arrival of this extremely attractive butterfly species to Cloatley Meadows.




Hankerton defibrillator checkers



Guide us Lord along the paths that we should take, encourage and strengthen us with your Holy Spirit.


We lift to you, all those who are struggling or ill; and pray that you will be alongside them, bringing your light and love so they will have hope.

Thank you. Amen.



Brian Dalton



It is with great sadness that we report the passing of Brian Dalton in April 2022.

After 44 years living in Hankerton, Brian was well known throughout the village for all of his activities and his continuous support for the village.

He was not only an editor of the Grapevine but also the compiler and printer who spent many hours a week, every other month, ensuring that all the copies were printed the correct way up (well almost always!). After 13 years helping with the Grapevine and the 100th edition was produced, in April 2013 he passed on this job to others.

Brian was a valued member of the Parish Council, not afraid to take on responsibility. He worked as the Flood Prevention Officer for Hankerton; surveying the waterways and ditches around the village, speaking to landowners, local authorities, the Environment Agency and water boards with the aim of ensuring that rainwater left the Hankerton flood plain as quickly as possible to reduce the flooding risk for residents. Dealing with all of the above was never going to be simple and he put in many hours and a lot of hard work to achieve the improvements that benefit the village today.

He matched actions to words helping to improve footpaths around the village by installing kissing gates and a raised walkway on a particularly wet footpath.

He was an active Governor at Malmesbury School – again matching actions to words on Outward Bound weeks when his sense of fun was always appreciated by the pupils!

Brian was a great performer – whether it was doing the Punch and Judy Show (he also built the booth and special effects) or being on stage performing in the CHAOS pantomimes. His performances were enthusiastic and sometimes so good that he would terrify the younger children while some of his ‘flash-bangs’ terrified the cast and crew! Involved in scenery painting brought out another talent as he designed the revolving scenery – thanks from the crew were expressed at every subsequent performance!

He was also a founder member of the Hankerton Golf Club, taking the sport seriously enough to have built a practise putting green!

Brian was always ready to help others and raise money for good causes– whether it was for children’s education through the Education for the Children Foundation, or local causes. The Rotary Club of The South Cotswolds benefitted from his membership and enthusiasm for fixing things and pulling Father Christmas on his sleigh around Malmesbury and surrounding villages (he used his car...!).

Brian will be remembered by so many in the village for his generosity, sense of humour and honour and he leaves a big gap in many peoples’ lives as well as many treasured memories. Our condolences are sent to Frances, his two children Rachael and Oliver (who grew up in Hankerton) and Brian’s family.

Hankerton History Group

Exhibition May 7th, 8th, 9th 2022

Parish Council Meeting



The Parish Council met again in the middle of May and chose to re-elect Robin Tjolle as the Chairman for the coming year. As always there was much on the agenda but here follows a number of the key points - for full minutes and actions please visit <https://hankertonpc.wordpress.com/> .

The PC has decided to review how it handles new planning applications. From now on all new applications will be circulated to Cllrs by email with plans and papers viewed on-line (as before). Any straightforward and uncontentious applications would continue to be decided by email agreement between Cllrs. However any application that was deemed contentious, or potentially contentious, or more significant to the parish, would be "called in" for consideration at the next PC meeting.

It was also decided that additional steps were needed to inform residents about future applications (following the Wiltshire Council decision not to post green notices). All applications' basic details and later PC decisions on the applications were to be recorded on the PC website. But in addition a notice of new applications will be posted to the village website news page - which will then be automatically emailed to those who have subscribed to this page.

In order to mark the Queens Platinum Jubilee the PC have decided to buy a bench (with a plaque commemorating the Platinum Jubilee) to be placed in the churchyard. In addition the PC are continuing to investigate planting a tree and nominating a Jubilee Walk, and will also investigate acquiring a village flagpole, all to commemorate the Jubilee and Her Majesty's 70 years of service on the throne.

Finally the Minety Solar Farm has been permitted by Wilts Council. Construction is currently expected to start in Q2/2024. Good news - the applicants have also made available £60,000 to Hankerton Parish Council to spend on projects that will benefit the local community. More details on this will be published shortly.

We are currently looking for residents to join the PC – there is a vacancy now – and if you are interested or just wish to attend our meetings you will be more than welcome.
