## Nature Diary – August 2022

At the time of writing the weather is getting a lot warmer, and still the ground is crying out for some much needed rain. Hot weather would suit the subject of this month's diary, the Slow-worm (*Anguis fragilis*), but the extreme dryness makes finding food much more difficult.



The Slow-worm is a lizard, albeit a legless one, and if you are able to look closely at an individual, you will notice that it has eyelids, in contrast to all species of snakes which have a hard clear "spectacle" over their eyes and do not need to wash and wipe the eye surface through the action of eyelids. Being a reptile, it is reliant on sunshine for providing the heat to warm its body sufficiently for it to become active. That said, it is predominantly nocturnal, and usually spends the day under stones, boulders, discarded corrugated tin, which heat up during the day and transfer that heat to the Slow-worm underneath. It doesn't regularly bask in the sunshine like many snake species.

It is a creature of the wider countryside, large gardens and allotments. Its prey is usually slugs, snails, earthworms and numerous kinds of invertebrates, and so spends its time hunting in leaf litter and loose soil. It is said to be a bit "slow" seizing its prey when it finds it, seemingly spending quite a bit of time deciding what to do. Its partiality to slugs and snails make it a welcome guest for those keen on growing plants, rather than slug/snail food! In the garden, if present, they are most likely to be found around compost heaps, which provide abundant food opportunities.

Sadly, cats do like to predate them so the chances of them inhabiting our gardens are low if there are cats in the neighbourhood, and they are also preyed upon by foxes, toads, rats, snakes and birds of prey. Their only defence against predators (they are not venomous) is the ability to detach its tail if that is seized, so that the predator is distracted by a wriggling tail, while the Slow-worm hopefully makes its escape. This ability is called *caudal autotomy*, and perhaps is the influence for the creature's Latin name, which means "fragile snake". The tail will regrow but not to its former glory, just a functional stub.

Adults grow to be about 50 cms (20 inches) long. There is no obvious neck, and the body shape flows sleekly from nose to tail tip. They are thought to be one of the longest living lizards in the world, with ages up to 30 years for wild living individuals and the longest captive record was 54 years. Males tend to be paler than females, sometimes with blue spots on the back, and the females have dark sides and often a dark stripe down the back.



Mating takes place in the Spring, and the eggs are retained within the female until she gives birth in July or August, and the young break out of the very thin-shelled eggs immediately afterwards. They are known as being *Ovoviviparous*, in contrast to our common lizard, which is *Viviparous*, where live young are delivered not in a shell. The new-born Slow-worms are independent from birth, are about 7 – 10 cms long, and a female would give birth to around 8 young (on average).

I have never seen a live Slow-worm in the village, but sadly, have seen them dead on the roads having been run over by a passing vehicle. So they are in the village. If you want to encourage them in your own gardens there are things you can do.

Obviously a compost heap is a good idea (providing shelter and food), laying out a piece of old tin sheet or flat wooden board in a sunny spot may encourage them to shelter underneath (and provide an opportunity to see them), and leaving some areas of the garden in a rougher, less tidy state, with longer vegetation and maybe a small log pile. The latter attracts other species as well, so is always a good thing for those wanting to see a larger variety of species sharing their gardens. They are harmless, fascinating friends of the keen gardener, and deserve our support.




## Bonfires

During the Covid shutdowns Wiltshire Council asked householders to not light bonfires because of people with respiratory problems. These conditions have not gone away and neither has Covid, so lighting bonfires can still cause problems.

Lighting a bonfire without consideration for those around you can cause them distress - whether it limits the enjoyment of their garden, causes smoke to enter houses through open windows or to have ash landing in the garden and on washing. Smoke travels a long way so be aware of wind direction.

It is suggested that, out of courtesy, you inform a neighbour that you wish to light a bonfire so they may close windows etc.



There are also safety considerations:

- Do not burn wet or green vegetation as this makes more smoke
- Do be aware of the position of a bonfire so it does not spread and set fire to adjacent fences or hedges.
- Do not leave a fire unattended and ensure it is completely extinguished when you have finished.

## Rotary Club

It is with great sadness that we report that the local Rotary Club of the South Cotswolds closed with effect from 30<sup>th</sup> June 2022. The Club was chartered in June 1967 and had as its first President Charles Nicholls, the popular manager of Lloyds Bank in Tetbury, who continued to be an active member of the Club until his death in December 2020 aged 96.

The Club was based on the two towns of Malmesbury and Tetbury, historically great local rivals! Initially the club met weekly with one week in Tetbury and the other week in Malmesbury. Over the years it has met in a number of locations including the Kings Arms in Malmesbury, the Horse Guards at Brokenborough, the Mayfield at Crudwell and finally at the Old Royal Ship at Luckington.

Throughout its 55 year history the Club has carried out numerous activities raising hundreds of thousands of pounds for both local and national charities. In addition to its fund-raising events, community service projects were carried out. A key one for Malmesbury was the annual Santa Sleigh – that toured streets in Malmesbury and in a number of the surrounding villages. The most notable for Tetbury was the annual “Fireworks Spectacular” last held in November 2019. This provided a safe environment for people to enjoy a superb pyrotechnic display at an affordable cost (far cheaper and more spectacular than buying the usual family box of fireworks!) - and visited one year by a certain Mrs Diana Wales and her two sons from nearby Highgrove.



One of the main fundraising events organised by the Club was the annual “fun run” in Badminton Park. This started in 1984 and was originally conceived as a team event - hence its original name “Horseless Team Event” (abbreviated to HTE) where teams ran over a 5

mile or 9 mile course which included some of the obstacles used in the Badminton Horse Trials. Over the years it raised hundreds of thousands of pounds for good causes including the local charity “Hope for Tomorrow”. It also provided useful activity for the Malmesbury and Tetbury ATCs to demonstrate their communications skills in providing radio cover throughout the park. Among the celebrities who opened the event was the Olympic Gold Medal runner

Sally Gunnell. For many years the event regularly attracted over a thousand entrants, but over time with the increased popularity of half marathons and park runs it became harder



to attract large numbers of entrants and, hence, raise large amounts of money for charity. In recent years the HTE was opened to a separate category of “canni-cross” runners where runners harness themselves to one or more dogs to help pull them round the course which proved increasingly popular and attracted entrants from as far away as Kent.



The Club has also through the wider Rotary movement engaged in International Activities. Old tools were collected for the “Tools for Self Reliance” project in Africa, computers were procured to be sent to South Africa and the Sight Savers initiative was strongly supported with millions of eye patches supplied. More locally, the club made significant contributions to the Brighter Futures project to provide radiotherapy facilities at the Great Western Hospital and to the Life Education Centre (LEC) mobile classroom that visits many of the primary schools in Malmesbury and the surrounding villages.

When the Club was originally Chartered most of the members were in their 40s but as with all organisations the members get older and unfortunately we were not able to attract new younger members in sufficient numbers to continue. Times, family priorities and work pressures have changed and the absence of a single geographical focus did not help.

However, we have had a good run and achieved a lot of good over the past 55 years through our enthusiasm, teamwork and capabilities – and lots of fun and fellowship.

## Update from Hankerton PC



The Hankerton Parish Council meets regularly and had its latest meeting on the 4<sup>th</sup> July to discuss a number of areas affecting the village. They were pleased to note that a number of plans to develop the village had come to fruition including the installation of a Wild Flower verge (led by Cllr Dai Davies) and the new bench celebrating the Queens Platinum Jubilee in the Church yard (led by Cllr Robin Tjolle). Please feel free to sit and enjoy the views of our beautiful church. The Parish Council were also pleased to welcome their new member Cllr Kate Nurden and the election of Cllr Jacqui Erskin-Crum as the new deputy chair.

Ideas to further develop the village were also discussed including installing a flag pole by the bus shelter (so we can raise a relevant flag to celebrate upcoming anniversaries and other events) – views from residents on whether they would support this would be welcome in time for the next meeting. Also the PC would welcome suggestions on where to site further wild flower verges in the village. Plans are also underway to resurface the turning circle by the church and improve the path behind Hillwell. The PC also agreed to scale back on unnecessary verge cutting throughout the village.

The PC is keen to see how it can support events within the village post-pandemic to bring residents together on a more regular basis and again suggestions are welcome.

Finally, the PC also agreed a revised process for considering planning applications (following Wiltshire County Council's decision to remove the installation of green signs).

The Parish Council meetings are open to all and the decisions it makes affect all of us and our surroundings so it would be great to see all those who are interested come along - especially those with views on flagpoles, events and wild flowers! The next meeting is 5<sup>th</sup> September in the North Aisle at 7:30pm. We hope to see you then.



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## **Surgery News**

Dr Neil retired at the end of March and this coincided with the return of a Dr from maternity leave, therefore staff numbers had remained constant.

In January two new clinical practitioners joined with the targeted aim of seeing new patients.

Two Clinical pharmacists have joined the practise whose time is to be shared across the partnership group (five practices of Malmesbury, Purton, Sherston, Cricklade & Royal Wootton Bassett) with an emphasis on care home and care residence.

Two new paramedics are due to start in August and will deal with minor illness clinics, urgent visits and frailty clinics.

Drive to build “Living well” team of 4 or 5 staff, focusing on social prescribing and weight management.

Soon to be working across the network is a Mental Health Worker, but no start date has been set, who will be targeting extreme crisis patient care.

## **Premises**

A new phone provider has been chosen and has an expected start date on 1 September, which will introduce a new unlimited queuing system.

As from 1 October the surgery will be open later. The plan is for Malmesbury to be open on a Thursday evening until 8pm.

A decision has been made to make the wearing of masks within Malmesbury Primary Care Centre non mandatory for patients.

## **Health matters**

Recalls for Long Term conditions have now restarted, using a patient’s month of birth as the trigger point. The aim is for a single appointment to cover all conditions of the patient.

NHS health checks are restarting, periodically every 5 years.

Health checks for Mental Health patients are to begin.

From 1 October, Flu/Covid jabs start being delivered.

NHS England South West Public Health Commissioning is starting to reduce the age for bowel screening. It will be managed in a phased approach over the next few years and invitation has been extended to those aged between 56 and 60 in Bath, Somerset & Wiltshire.

## Hankerton Amenity Area

The Amenity Area is at the entrance to Old Farm Close on the left-hand side as you go in. In the late 1980s the chicken farm (now Old Farm Close) was closed down due to the smell and proximity to homes.

The land was sold to a developer who agreed to provide the village with a play area as part of the planning application. The houses in Old Farm Close were then built, followed by the demolition of the managers bungalow in 1996, where one house was built.

What happened next...

After many discussions in the village as the Amenity Area was not being used, in 1997 a grant was applied for and the area planted with bulbs and trees. The land was poor and full of builder's rubbish so a team of people cleared as much as they could before replacing it with topsoil in preparation for planting.



A seat was erected by David Pynn, an area of brambles etc left as a wild-life refuge and all the bulbs were donated by Anne and Walter Brown with the shrubs and trees purchased from Nick Durnford who helped to clear the area. People responded to the challenge of sorting out the area - you may well recognise some of the hard-working labourers!





Refreshments and encouragement were supplied by the Newman family in Old Farm Close. In order to keep the area neat and tidy over the years, volunteers pruned, chopped down and cut the grass in the area. Some of you may well remember Brian Dalton speeding along the lane on his mower to regularly cut the grass (over many years!) and the sound of chain saws as the trees in the area were cut back.

The Amenity Area is still there but a feasibility study found that it is really too small to be used as a playground and, once more, is reverting to a wildlife area. If anyone has any ideas about how to use this area – please let the Parish Council know as it does need a plan! Anyone up for turning it into a village orchard?

- Free Wi-Fi, computer and scanner access, plus printing for a small charge
- Staff who can provide basic help and support when using the library computers or your own device
- Bookable digital support sessions to help you learn more about using your smartphone, tablet, laptop or the library computers
- Information books to support hobbies, days out, job seeking and study
- Study spaces
- Free access to Ancestry and British Newspaper Archive on the library computers
- Free access to TheoryTestPro to practise driving theory and hazard tests
- Large print books for people who need a bigger font
- A mobile library service with regular stops
- A Home Library Service taking books to people in their homes who are unable to visit the library themselves
- Seating throughout for you to enjoy a book or read the newspaper

Here at Malmesbury Library we've returned to pre-pandemic opening hours and host many events and community groups throughout the week. Rhyme times for babies and toddlers take place on Tuesdays and Fridays, and our reading group meets on the third Wednesday of the month.
