I usually try to write about something that at the time of publication there is a good chance you may actually see around the village. This month's subject is one that you are very unlikely to see – at all. Primarily, this is because it lives underground and rarely ventures above, so although occasionally a corpse of one is found, I have never seen a live Mole (*Talpa europaea*). That said, you are often very aware of their existence because of the presence of heaps of soil, molehills, seen in pastures, woods and sometimes lawns (to the annoyance of the enthusiastic gardener!).

The mole is a small, cylindrically shaped animal with dark grey coloured, short and very dense fur. The hair is not directional, i.e. it doesn't lie in a particular direction, which allows the mole to move forwards or backwards in its tunnel system without "brushing its fur the wrong way". The most obvious feature of a mole's anatomy are the very developed front legs with huge "hands", evolved to allow efficient digging in soil. If the soil is loose, it will "swim" through the soil, breast-stroke fashion. If compacted it will use one hand at a time to break up the soil, pushing it behind it, and moving on. The old name for the mole was "Mouldewarp", which comes from old Saxon, where "molde" means earth, and "warpen" means to throw.

Obviously creating tunnels means that it has to get rid of the spoil, so it digs a vertical tunnel to the surface and pushes the surplus up and out of the ground, creating the familiar molehill. I have often wondered why the soil doesn't fall back down the vertical shaft? To date I haven't come across the explanation.

Moles are about 15 cm long, excluding the 4 cm tail, weigh 70 – 130g and live for about 3 years. They are solitary in nature, in fact described as very intolerant of each other, except during the breeding season when a degree of indulgence is allowed. Males will fight violently if they meet, and the female will only tolerate the young for about 4 weeks after their birth before sending them on their way.

Living in the dark, underground, means that the eyes have limited use, and they have evolved so that probably they can now only detect movement, and dark and light. That said, they have a fantastic ability to appreciate their underground environment with skin that contains more organs of touch than any other animal, and their hearing is good.



They even have a good array of sense organs on their backside for going backwards. Another adaptation is that their blood has a variation of haemoglobin that makes better use of the lower levels of oxygen found in a sub-terranean environment.

Moles feed on invertebrates, especially earthworms. The latter are usually detected when they fall into the mole's tunnel system, and before consuming, the mole squeezes along the length of the worm to expel the dirt and soil from the worm's gut. In time of plenty the mole will store surplus worms in a larder, biting off the head of the worm and balling it up before storage. I did read that if stored for too long, the worms can regrow a head and make their escape! Sounds outlandish.


They also eat carrion apparently. A naturalist records being interested in observing the small carrion feeders (beetles and flies) and how they dealt with a dead shrew or mouse. She covered the corpse with a wire canopy to keep away crows, etc. but the bodies kept disappearing. One day she noticed movement under the canopy and saw a mole retrieving the dead mouse and taking it away. She then added soft sand around the future corpses, and only ever found the footprints of moles when the bodies disappeared again.

I mentioned molehills being a nuisance for the gardener, but these spoils of earth also can cause problems with preserved grass for livestock, in that the heaps can be picked up when the cut grass is collected, and it causes the grass crop to spoil. In the garden their tunnels can cause unsightly subsidence in a lawn, as well as the heaps, and in the veg patch undermine growing plants so they fail to thrive. Moles do not eat the roots of plants. So, there is a long history of people controlling (killing) moles for various reasons, but there are benefits from their toils. The extensive network of tunnels (they can tunnel up to 20 metres in a day!) allows for aeration of the soil and helps with drainage, but maybe it is time for us to show more tolerance of those creatures around us and put up with the activities of a fascinating creature – even if we don't get lucky enough to see it. And remember, Moley was a goody in "Wind in the Willows".



Dr Bendor Grosvenor - The Invention of British Art

Britain has produced some of the world's most famous artists and paintings. But what made British art 'great'? Was it the individual genius of artists like Hogarth and Constable? Or were their careers shaped by a distinctly 'British' society, culture and history? And if so, why has that distinctiveness been overlooked, and why have we ignored so many of the characters who helped create the story of British art?

In *The Invention of British Art*, Bendor Grosvenor embarks on a journey of discovery through an incredible array of artworks and artists from 10,000 BCE to the nineteenth century, revealing how the art from these isles was created, what made it distinctive, and why it took so long to emerge. From folk art to the role of female artists, from the influences of invaders to the colonised territories of the British Empire, the book embraces previously overlooked contributions to the story of British art and explores the cultural, political and economic factors that helped to shape it.

Dr Bendor Grosvenor is an art historian specialising in Old Masters and British art. Best known from the BBC series *Britain's Lost Masterpieces* and *Fake or Fortune?*, he has discovered a number of important paintings by prominent artists including Van Dyck, Rubens, Titian, Gainsborough, Beale and Lawrence. He previously worked in the London art trade and is now based in Scotland.

Surgery News

Malmesbury Primary Care Centre (MPCC) has signed up to administer the autumn flu and Covid jabs and sessions will start in October.

Patients will receive invitations to book appointments.

There is concern this year with respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) and certain patients will be offered the vaccine during September.

PATCHs

Contact can be made between 6-11am each weekday morning.

Phone requests can be made up to two weeks in advance with a GP of your choice.

So far 2.5k patients have registered to use the system.

In the future there is the intention to open it up for a longer period of time.

This has reduced the number of calls received at 8am.

POD

The necessary IT changes have been made to enable MPCC prescriptions to move over to the new pharmacy - Malmesbury Pharmacy and Travel Clinic.

Their opening times are:

Monday - Friday 8.30am to 9pm

Saturday - 8.30am to 8.30pm

Sunday - 10.00am - 4pm

Telephone number - 01666 826115

Whilst some patients may have experienced delays with their prescriptions requests to date things will settle down and it's hoped prescriptions will be processed on the same day.

Prescription requests cannot be ordered more than 2 weeks in advance.

The MPCC phone lines are running from 2-3pm for prescription requests for those patients who don't have access to IT.

GP Action

The BMA gave GP's 10 actions to consider regarding withdrawing their support for certain work streams.

MPCC GP's are not planning to take any collective action at this point in time.

Miscellaneous

100 appointments have been provided to help patients use the NHS app. If anyone would like further details on this then please contact the surgery.





If you spend any time on social media, or out with friends, or in the pub, you'll see how enraged people get when they see something they perceive as incorrect or unjust. From the smallest grammatical error to the atrocities of war, people are extremely vocal in expressing their

distaste regarding what is wrong in our world.

As I write this the Olympics have recently finished, and the world has listened with horror and revulsion to the fate of Olympian, Rebecca Cheptegei, who was set on fire by her ex boyfriend on her return home, and died from her injuries. What are we doing about it?

Are we actively trying to seek the facts regarding refugees, the homeless or dispossessed, or having our opinions shaped by the loudest voice? Are we putting our money where our mouths are and offering support? Are we, even for one moment, putting ourselves into their shoes and asking what should we do about it?



What good is it if someone claims to have faith but has no deeds? Can such faith save them? Suppose a brother or a sister is without clothes and daily food. If one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and well fed," but does nothing about their physical needs, what good is it? In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead.

Our world is very far from perfect but, whether we have any faith or none, every single one of us, by our mere existence, WILL change the world. Whether we chose to change it for better or for worse is up to us.
