## Nature Diary – June 2026

Many of us have kept orchids indoors and enjoyed their colour and form, some of them looking exceedingly exotic, as well they might, as the majority of the species (of which there are 15,000 worldwide) come from the warmer parts of the globe. Here in the UK, we can enjoy our own native species, not only in well protected flower-rich meadows, but often in the unlikeliest places, such as wasteland, motorway verges and even power-station fly-ash tips.

Perhaps the best place locally to enjoy the spectacle provided by orchids blooming on masse is Clattinger Farm at Oaksey, where they flower in the thousands. Most will be Common Spotted Orchids, but also present are Green Winged Orchids, Bee

Orchids, Southern Marsh Orchids and Twayblades. The Bee Orchids are few and far between, whereas the Twayblade is all green (even the flowers) and blends in very well with the rest of the vegetation, so it takes some spotting. Sometimes crosses between Common Spotted and Southern Marsh occur, and hybrid vigour produces a plant that is much bigger than either of the parents. This hybridisation can also make accurate identification problematical, but it doesn't stop you enjoying them.

Hankerton does have orchids as well. There are a small number of Common Spotted growing in the conservation area in the churchyard, and a Pyramidal Orchid has found its way to the area outside the kitchen of the church. Cloatley Meadows in the last few years has developed quite a good population of Common Spotted along with a few Green Winged.

Orchids are perennial and grow from paired tubers below ground. These were described by Pliny the Elder, the Roman naturalist, as looking like testicles, and later the name *Orchis* was applied, which also means testis. The very variable flowers are sometimes designed to attract a specific pollinator species, as in the Bee Orchid, which is supposed to look like the female bee

of the species, and pollination occurs when the male bee lands on the flower to mate. However, in the UK the specific bee species is absent, and so self-pollination takes place in order to produce seed for the next generation. Some flowers produce scent to attract pollinators, which are usually day-flying moths, bees and sometimes beetles.

The seed produced by orchids is extremely fine – dust-like even – and this allows the seed to travel long distances on the wind, which perhaps explains how the Pyramidal Orchid “arrived” in the churchyard. The seed is so fine that it contains no nutrients for the development of the new orchid, and it is dependant on alighting on ground containing specific fungal mycorrhizal networks into which it can tap and draw off the required nutrients for growth. The ground in the churchyard has been undisturbed for hundreds of years (save for occasional grave digging) and one would expect a good representation of fungal networks there, and of many species.

I understand that it takes about 7 years for the seed of the Bee Orchid to grow into a plant strong enough to produce a flower. If you were to sow seed of the Bee Orchid in your lawn you would have to have patience, and hope that the correct fungal network is present to allow it to germinate and grow.

The Common Spotted Orchid is so called because the rosette of leaves at the base of the plant are spotted with purple spots. The flowers themselves vary from white through pale pink to pinkish-purple. The petals are themselves spotted, and the lower lip petal is noticeably divided into three, the central division forming an obvious point. Distinguishing species of orchid can come down to careful observation of certain

characteristics, and can be challenging, but don't let it put you off trying.

The Twayblade, although all green and difficult to spot, is still a very attractive plant. It has two large, flat, green leaves held out horizontally, through which the flower spike grows centrally. In Hankerton Copse on Cloatley Meadows, there are about 10 plants growing just off the path in the north-west corner of the copse. An unusual spot to find them, but easier to find because of the relative scarcity of surrounding vegetation.

As I write, much publicity is being given to “No Mow May” in an effort to allow more flowers to bloom in grass for the benefit of pollinators.

Extending this approach for a part of your lawn to the whole of the summer, may, after a few

years yield the delightful result of allowing some orchids to establish themselves, after blowing in on the wind. Just a thought!

Look at your life, concentrate on positive ties.

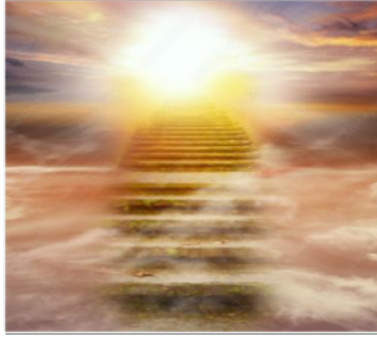
Francis of Assisi wrote the Canticle of the Sun, which praises the Lord.

## **Our River, Our Responsibility**

June is a generous month in this corner of north Wiltshire. The lanes around Hankerton are at their best as the light lasts well into the evening, and there's a particular pleasure in this part of the constituency that I never take for granted when I'm in Westminster wishing I were back here.

It's also a good moment to take

stock of what's been happening and what I've been working on across the area.

Water quality and river health have been a major focus for me since I was elected, and that work has roots close to Hankerton. Just a few miles away in Malmesbury, the No Swimming sign at Daniel's Well on the River Avon tells a story that shouldn't need telling in 2026; Sewage discharges from a nearby overflow, residents falling ill, wildlife disappearing from a river that runs through the heart of a market town. I've been pressing the Government for clearer answers and real accountability, and I'm not letting up. What happens to the Avon affects the wider catchment, and that includes communities throughout this part of the constituency.

Last month I met with Laura Reineke, founder of the River Guardians Network, a community-led initiative to give people along the Thames a genuine role in

monitoring and protecting their stretch of river. It's worth remembering that the Thames doesn't begin somewhere far away. It rises at Thames Head near Kemble, just a short distance from here. We are, in a very real sense, headwaters country and what happens to water management in this part of Wiltshire matters well beyond our own parishes.

Laura is working to grow the network of river guardians across the upper Thames, connecting local groups who already care about water quality with a broader movement for accountability and stewardship. I'll be sharing more details in the coming weeks. If anyone in or around Hankerton has an interest in getting involved, I'd love to hear from you.

Flooding is the other thread running through this work. It is something I see regularly affecting so many lives in this constituency, and I will always do my best to ease the pressure it can cause. That work is ongoing, and the connection between flood risk, drainage infrastructure, and the health of our rivers is one I keep making in Parliament.

Beyond water, my regular surgeries continue across the constituency. My team is always on hand for casework - whether that's NHS concerns, planning issues, or anything else affecting daily life in villages like Hankerton. The best way to reach us is via the office contact below.

Small communities sometimes feel overlooked. They shouldn't be, and as far as I'm concerned, they aren't. The knowledge that residents here have about their own patch is exactly what good representation depends on.
